# The Camellia Competition and Show 1986

Bulletin no. 29 (August, 1985) included a note from a member living in Putney, complaining at the innovation of allowing camellias grown under glass to compete against those grown in the open at the 1985 Camellia Show, as they have always done at the earlier Camellia Competition. For those who exhibit camellias grown in the open this was a blow, as hitherto they had stood a better chance of competing at the Show in April than at the Competition in March where they met on level terms those grown under glass, and most exhibitors were unaware of the change until they received the schedules early in March.

In 1986 however, the situation has been restored in this respect, and the schedules have been made more attractive in other respects as well. The Competition, a week later than last year, has 7 new classes for hybrid sprays. The Show, two days earlier than last year, has 15 classes for sprays, as was the case last year, but all from the open. The 12 bloom class, for the Leonardslee Bowl, is only for blooms from the open, and in fact all except four of the classes at the Camellia Show are for exhibits grown in the open, and the exceptions are clearly stated.

The relevant regulation is regulation 5, which has been re-drafted, and now reads:

'Exhibits grown in the open or under glass - At the Competition (March 18/19) exhibits may have been grown under glass or in the open. At the Show (April 8/9) exhibits must have been grown in the open except those entered for classes 30, 35, 40 and 45, which must have been grown under glass. When blooms are cut from

plants growing in tubs or other containers, the plants must have been standing in the open for the six months prior to the Show to qualify as "grown in the open".'

The specified classes are:

- 30. Any three single flowered cultivars of Camellia japonica.
- 35. Any three semi-double cultivars of Camellia japonica.
- 40. Any three anemone-formed and/or paeony-formed cultivars of Camellia japonica.
- 45. Any three rose-formed and/or formal double cultivars of Camellia japonica.

There are also equivalent classes for three blooms of these groups grown in the open, so it will be possible to compare those grown in the open with those grown under glass.

This one is for the Acer enthusiast but has the added bonus of some rare oaks and seedlings from wild collected seed in China, Korea and Japan.
